OPERATION ENCOMPASS

Our school is part of Operation Encompass which is a national scheme that operates jointly between schools and police forces. Operation Encompass is the reporting to schools, prior to the start of the next school day, when a child or young person has experienced domestic abuse.

As a school we have ensured that our Designated Safeguarding Lead, Sharon Jackson, known as a Key Adult, has been trained in the Operation Encompass procedures allowing us to then use the information that has been shared, in confidence, to support the child/ren in our care.

The Domestic Abuse Act 2021 identifies children who experience domestic abuse as victims of domestic abuse in their own right.

We are keen to offer the best support possible to all our pupils and we believe this will be extremely beneficial for all those involved.




Learning Journeys This Half Term



Reception have been jet setters this term. We flew Asia, looking at different counties and their cultures. We then jetted off to the North Pole with Santa and finally to Bethlehem to perform our Nativity. The children have made us very proud.



Year Two have had a busy half term looking at various inspirational figures throughout history. While learning about Thomas Edison, we have learnt all about electricity & experimented with circuits. As part of their DT project, the children designed marvellous marble mazes to challenge Michael Jordan. We have also been learning about Thomas Bernardo and travelled back to the Victorian era.



In Year 4, this term we have been looking at the history of slavery from the first recorded examples in Ancient Greece to how slavery unfortunately still happens in this country today. As well as this we have been investigating forces by carrying out lots science investigations to find out which forces act on different objects and how changing the forces affect the way objects move.



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Year 1's learning journey has been all about "Come fly with Me -Artic Circle". We have had a great time learning all about the Arctic. We have made igloos and learned about all different types of Arctic animals!



Year 3 have been super busy this half term, starting with learning all about the continent of Africa. We practised African dance, African drumming techniques and made banana and mango smoothies after learning about fair trade. The children then learned about the locations of Dover, France and Canada before producing a presentation on a city/town from France.



Year 5 have been learning all about North America this half term. We have looked at the different habitats across the continent and the animals which live in them, written our own national anthems after listening to a variety from across the world and created beautiful dream catchers. We have finished the half term with a focus on geography, looking at Hong Kong and trade including imports and exports.



This half term, Year Six's learning journey, titled 'I Have A Dream', has involved them learning all about the Windrush Generation and creating art based on Althea McNish, a famous textile designer from Trinidad. We have also looked at Martin Luther King's inspirational speech and studied the apartheid in South Africa. We looked at how diversity and multiculturalism can bring so many advantages to the world too.

Cross Country

Despite one event being cancelled, we're really impressed with the amount of children who have been committed to attending the Cross Country races. It's the largest amount of children we've had attend in a few years.

Well done to all of the children for participating in these events - it takes a lot of courage to put yourselves forward. 
